A Letter to our Stakeholders:

Dear Friends of ReWork:

As ReWork's executive director, I frequently talk about how ReWork's approach to helping East End Richmond families find employment and lift themselves out of poverty is different. And then people ask, "how does it work?" Naturally, a follow up question is, "why does ReWork's unique approach work?"

The answers to both questions are somewhat inter-related but let me start with the "how." ReWork's approach works because it's different. ReWork doesn't merely connect job seekers with a random assortment of openings that require minimal skills and pay a minimum wage. Instead, ReWork takes the time to invest in its program's participants, whom we call "Members," as a means of providing them with the connections necessary to securing viable, long term, career opportunities – opportunities that pay a wage sufficient to support a family. It's our strategy of investing, to provide job seekers with the actual tools they need to succeed, that makes the critical difference.

And let me add, ReWork's investment in human potential pays off. By delivering real social and economic value to our Members, Members and their families not only benefit but so does the larger community as a whole. Elsewhere in this report, we invite you to review more specific details about the impact ReWork has on its Members, and how we continually measure that impact.

There are a number of answers as to why ReWork is successful. One major factor is the support of our many community partners, who refer potential Members to ReWork, and who are always ready to provide both educational and logistical assistance, as needed. Also included among these partners is

our extensive network of volunteers who help our Members develop valuable career preparedness skills and provide guidance in personal communication and life management disciplines, such as financial planning.

Importantly, ReWork's success is further made possible by the confidence employers have shown in our Members. This confidence is a direct result of our dedicated and knowledgeable staff, who take great pride in ensuring Members receive the exact training they need to meet individual employer demands, and who build mutual relationships with employers that help establish continued hiring opportunities.

Of course, we'd be remiss in not acknowledging the role our Members themselves play in our success. Their hard work and efforts to recommend ReWork to new program candidates, and their willingness to embrace new roles as models for change within their families and the community, are an inspiration that has become a hallmark of ReWork's culture. Quite simply, our Members are our rock stars.

Finally, much of our success is certainly a result of you, our donors – your strong commitment to joining us in our efforts to continue transforming lives and creating economically viable futures for a growing number of East End families. 

ReWork Richmond is Different.

2024: Measuring Our Impact

Since its inception, ReWork has focused on measuring how its program transforms the lives of its Members. In 2024, our measurement approach tracked Member progress from two perspectives.



Crisis to Thriving Progress

The first, using the widely respected Crisis to Thriving (CT) continuum, assessed our Members' progress in six critical areas: employment, income, education, housing, childcare and transportation. Upon enrollment, we assign a numeric

score in these areas to each member. The scores represent the Members' positions in each area and provide us with a baseline indication of member achievement, which we track quarterly as a means of assessing progress.

The graph below summarizes the combined cumulative scores for 2024, for all Members, in all categories, who have been active program Members for at least one year.

Starting Score 42.9/100
Ending Score 60.0/100

The increase from 42.9–60 represents a

collective increase towards stability.



Program Economic Value

The second measurement approach assesses our program's wider financial impact on our Members' lives. This past year was the first time we sought to measure ReWork's dollar return to members and the community.

As noted below, our study identified three factors as important indications of ReWork's economic impact on our Members lives:

Member salaries over earnings at increased enrollment.

Subsidies in dependence on decreased government assistance

Members paid over

more taxes than at enrollment.


The above is based on 30 months being the average number of months for a member to attain a measure of stable in the crisis to thriving model and attain earnings at or near a sustaining wage.




Our measurement tracking shows the economic value of investing in human potential. It reveals the community's financial return from a more stable workforce earning higher wages and paying more taxes. Additionally, reduced reliance on government assistance brings meaningful emotional benefits to our Members.
